Robert Franz MUSIC DIRECTOR

Robert Franz, Music Director of the Windsor Symphony Orchestra since 2013, sees music as a way to connect people and to transform lives.

A recipient of the Arts Leadership Award for the Windsor Endowment for the Arts, Franz is committed to programming that engages, challenges, and entertains. Over the past decade. programming has included 5 world premieres and a roster of quest artists ranging from an internationally acclaimed astronaut to world class musicians to local aspiring performers. Collaborations have included the Windsor International Film Festival, Art Windsor Essex, Canadian Historical Aviation Association, Windsor Public Library, St. Clair College, and the University of Windsor. Through Franz' work, the WSO has become a catalyst for a wide variety of artists in multiple genres and disciplines.

Robert is an enthusiastic advocate for music education. This season marks the second annual Conductor's Guild Workshop with the Windsor Symphony Orchestra to train conductors in the art of creating and presenting effective student concerts. This is the only workshop of this kind in North America.

Robert is co-founder and Conductor of the Idaho Orchestra Institute. Now in its seventh year, Franz takes young musicians on an exploration of major



orchestral repertoire that explores the complete musician. In addition to his current posts as Artistic Director of the Boise Baroque Orchestra and Music Director of the UNCSA Symphony Orchestra, Franz served as Associate Conductor of the Houston Symphony (2008-2022). Music Director of the Boise Philharmonic (2008-2016), and the Mansfield Symphony in Ohio (2003-2010). When not on the podium, he can be found on the slopes, skiing slowly and carefully, stretching in a yoga class, and non-competitively trying his hardest to win at a game of cards with his family.

Francisco Hernández Bolaños ASSISTANT CONDUCTOR

Assistant Conductor of the Windsor Symphony Orchestra, Francisco Hernández Bolaños leads the Windsor Symphony Youth Orchestras and the Windsor Symphony Community Orchestra. He is also the musical lead for the WSO's Education and Outreach programs, which bring music education programming into schools.

Hailing from Mexico, Francisco was the Music Director of the State of Veracruz Youth Symphony Orchestra (OSJEV) and was the Assistant Conductor of the Arizona State University Orchestra, the Phoenix Youth Symphony Orchestras, and the School of Music at the University of Veracruz Symphony Orchestra.

With a rapidly ascending career, Francisco appeared frequently as a guest conductor for orchestras all across Mexico, including the Aguascalientes Symphony Orchestra, the Philharmonic Orchestra of the State of Querétaro, the University of Hidalgo Symphony Orchestra, the University of Guanajuato Symphony Orchestra, and the Cancún Symphony Orchestra. Francisco is passionate about sharing



music with new audiences, and offered community outreach concerts with OSJEV and music appreciation workshops to help create a new generation of concert goers, in various states of Mexico.

Francisco graduated with a Bachelor of Music (Honours) in piano performance and a Master of Music in conducting from the School of Music at the University of Veracruz, and recently earned his Doctorate in Musical Arts in Orchestra and Opera Conducting from Arizona State University.

In addition to conducting, Francisco enjoys reading a great book and good coffee in the company of wonderful people. Francisco enjoys food from different cultures, which keeps him on the lookout for new culinary experiences!

Dr. Bruce J.G. Kotowich

CHORUS MASTER

Bruce J. G. Kotowich, DMA, is the Acting Director of SoCA (School of Creative Arts) and an Associate Professor of Music- Director of Choral Activities at the University of Windsor where he directs the University of Windsor Chamber Choir and USingers and teaches courses in Choral Techniques. In the Windsor Essex community, Dr. Kotowich is the Chorus Master for the Windsor Symphony Orchestra Chorus and the Artistic Director of the Windsor Classic Chorale.

Dr. Kotowich completed his Doctor of Musical Arts in Choral Conducting and Masters of Music in Conducting at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. He received his Associateship of Music in Vocal Performance from the Royal Conservatory of Music, Toronto, and a Bachelor of Music and a Bachelor of Education from the University of Manitoba. He is a recipient of numerous awards and honours including awards from the Canada Council for the Arts. Manitoba Arts Council. University of Cincinnati, the Archdiocese of St. Boniface Heritage Award, and the Mayor's Award for Excellence in the Arts for the City of Windsor.

His choirs have performed throughout North America, Europe, and China. Dr. Kotowich has conducted the Manitoba Provincial Senior High Honor Choir, Manitoba Provincial Jazz Choir, the South Dakota North Region All-State Choir, the Illinois Music Educators' Association District Honor Choir and numerous other festival and conference choirs. He conducted Ola Gjielo's Sunrise Mass at



Carnegie Hall, New York, with choristers from the Windsor Symphony Orchestra Chorus, Windsor Classic Chorale, University of Windsor, and choirs from Windsor Essex and London, Ontario., and will return to conduct Dan Forrest's Requiem for the Living in May 2024.

Dr. Kotowich is a sought after clinician. He has presented at the Symposium for Singing and Song, Podium-Choral Canada. Iowa Choral Directors' Association Summer Conference, the National Convention of the American Choral Directors' Association the NDSU Symposium, the North-Central Conference for ACDA, 2014 Choral Music from the Heartland of Europe to the Heartland of America: Czech Music for North American Audiences, and presented at the World Choral EXPO in Lisbon, Portugal in September 2022.

Dr. Kotowich is published in the Choral Research Memorandum Series through Chorus America and edits a choral publication series with Alliance Music Publications. In addition to his responsibilities at the University of Windsor, he is the former Editor-In-Chief of the Anacrusis.

PERFORMANCES OF HANDEL'S MESSIAH

The performance of Handel's Messiah by the Windsor Symphony Orchestra Chorus that we now enjoy every season, and expect to see in the program line up, can be traced back to the late 1970s. The first Chorus performance with the WSO was under the leadership of former WSO Artistic Director Matti Holli and Richard Householder, professor emeritus, University of Windsor. However Messiah was not the first work performed.

We asked Richard Householder about his recollections of the early days of choral music performances with the WSO. "The earliest concert I did with the Windsor Symphony Orchestra was on February 06, 1977, when the Windsor Community Choir, Dr. Gregory Butler, and I performed with the WSO. Matti Holli was the WSO Conductor at the time, and, at his request, I conducted the Beethoven Choral Fantasy, which was for choir, piano solo (Dr. Butler) and orchestra. Matti Holli conducted the rest of the concert.

The next season, the Women's Association of the WSO (now known as the WSO Guild) sponsored a special concert of Handel's Messiah that I conducted. It was the very first concert

the Windsor Classic Chorale (WCC) performed; I had formed the WCC that summer and we began rehearsals in the Fall. I conducted the WSO, the WCC, and four soloists. We performed the complete work (all 53 movements) on December 11, 1977. It was recorded by CBC-TV and played on several CBC stations across the country."

Two years later, the WCC and the WSO performed *Messiah* once again, with Householder conducting. After that, there was a gap of almost a decade before this community would hear *Messiah* performed live.

"Dwight Bennett was the first WSO conductor who was interested in performing oratorio and opera on a regular basis," says Richard Householder, "He asked me to form an ad hoc choir to perform Handel's Messiah with the orchestra." The performance took place on December 10, 1989, under the baton of then Music Director, Dwight Bennett. That marked the first performance of a volunteer choral group called the Windsor Symphony Orchestra Chorus. The choir was listed in the program as Windsor Symphony Orchestra Chorus featuring the Windsor Classic Chorale.

Following Dwight Bennett's departure, the WSO's annual performances of Handel's Messiah featured local soloists and choruses under Artistic Director Susan Haig, shining a spotlight on local talent throughout the 1990s.

Since then, the WSO has performed Handel's Messiah at a variety of venues in Windsor, Essex County, and Chatham-Kent, including Our Lady of Assumption Church, Holy Name of Mary Catholic Church, Holy Name of Mary Catholic Church, St. Andrew's United Church Chatham, the former Our Lady of the Rosary Church, Leamington United Mennonite Church, Ste Anne's Catholic Church Tecumseh, and the Chrysler Theatre.

Thanks to the vision of Richard Householder, several artistic directors, and the support of the WSO Guild in the early days, Handel's Messiah, with Orchestra and Chorus, is now a part of our holiday season every year.

Andrew McIntosh



Andrew McIntosh joined the Windsor Symphony Orchestra as Principal Cellist in 1997. Since that time, he has won section cello positions with the National Ballet of Canada (2004) and the Lancaster Festival Orchestra (1997). He also regularly performs in the cello section of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra (2000).

McIntosh has shared the stage with many artists ranging from Aretha Franklin and Styx to Pavarotti and Yo-Yo Ma. He has been featured as a soloist with the Windsor Symphony Orchestra, Lancaster Festival, 4th Wall Music, and Detroit's Scarab Club. Performance highlights include Detroit Symphony Orchestra and National Ballet tours to Japan, China, New York (Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Centre, City Centre), Western Canada, and playing in the Canadian Opera Company's presentation of Richard Wagner's epic Ring Cycle in celebration of the opening of the Four Seasons Centre for the Performing Arts in Toronto.

As an educator, McIntosh has taught many cello students in the Windsor area both privately and as the string instructor for Walkerville High School's Centre for Creative Arts. He enjoys making musical connections with the community through the WSO's Music Education and Music for Health series.

A native of London Ontario, McIntosh started cello in middle school and continued his studies to earn a Bachelor of Music from McGill University and a Master of Music from The Cleveland Institute of Music in Cello Performance. His main teachers have been Julia MacGregor, Walter Joachim, Michael Kilburn, and Allan Harris. McIntosh performs on a cello made by Jon Van Kouwenhoven in 1994.

Concerto No. 2 in E minor for Violoncello & Orchestra

Among his instrumental music, Victor Herbert's Second Cello Concerto (1894) deserves greater attention, not only because it has become standard repertoire but because of its historical importance as a stimulus to Antonín Dvořák. An analysis of the piece reveals a subtly crafted composition that brilliantly exploits the resources of the cello—Herbert's own instrument—and that builds upon the composer's earlier work for cello and orchestra. The work also exhibits that stylistic amalgam of Irish, German, and American elements that characterize Herbert's operetta scores. Scholars have long appreciated the fact that the piece helped inspire Dvořák to attempt a cello concerto of his own (1895). But Herbert might have influenced Dvořák's "American" music more generally. In turn, Dvořák's music—in particular, his "New World" Symphony—seems to have left its mark on Herbert's Second Concerto. In short, Herbert and Dvořák—colleagues at New York's National Conservatory in the early 1890s—engaged in a sort of musical dialogue, one that reflected differing ideas concerning nationalism and American music.

Symphony No. 8 in G major ANTONÍN DVOŘÁK

Dvořák's G major Symphony is decidedly genial and upbeat; and yet, we may be surprised by how much minor-key music actually inhabits this major-key symphony, beginning with the solemn introduction, richly scored to spotlight mid-range instruments. But joyful premonitions intrude, thanks to the birdcall of the solo flute. This develops into the ebullient principal theme of the movement, which, when it has run its course, we are likely to recall as overwhelmingly pastoral and optimistic. And yet the mournful music of the introduction returns as the movement progresses, and the development section is full of forbidding passages. This tempering of the bucolic spirit was deliberate. When Dvořák sketched the movement, it was unerringly cheerful. The minor-key introduction arrived as an afterthought, as did the considerably more difficult trick of working reminiscences of it into the existing flow of the piece. In the end, this opening movement provides a splendid example of how the sun seems to shine more brightly after it has been darkened by passing shadows.

Jeffrey Pollock CONDUCTOR



Jeffrey Pollock is known for his musical versatility and for his ability to make connections with audiences. Chosen by the League of American Orchestras as a featured conductor for their prestigious 2001 National Conductor Preview, he has performed with orchestras across North America including the Detroit, Houston, Nashville, Cleveland Chamber and Charlotte Symphonies in the US and the Hamilton Philharmonic, the Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony, and the Niagara Symphony in Canada. Currently in his third season as Music Director for Sinfonia Ancaster, he is expandina the audience base and the orchestra's reputation through his innovative and original concert programming.

A sensitive accompanist, Pollock has performed with virtuoso artists such as

Conrad Tao, Zuill Bailey, Angela Cheng and Jennifer Frautschi. While Associate Conductor with the Fort Worth Symphony and Resident Conductor of the Toledo Symphony, he worked with a wide variety of international performers, including Roberta Flack, Wynnona Judd, Randy Newman, Pink Martini, Nanci Griffith, Arturo Sandoval, and Natalie MacMaster.

For the opera stage, he has conducted productions of The Barber of Seville, Cavalleria Rusticana, and The Turn of the Screw and has worked as chorus master and vocal coach for several regional opera companies. When not on the podium, Jeff can be found mixing vintage cocktails, teaching, or exploring new hiking trails.

Caitlin Wood SOPRANO

Alberta-born soprano Caitlin Wood was "absolutely vibrant" and showed "great comic flair" in her debut as Susanna in Vancouver Opera Festival's The Marriage of Figaro. Caitlin portrayed Ava in City Opera Vancouver's 2017 world premiere of Marie Clements/ Brian Current's powerful opera Missing, showing "exquisite vulnerability".

Mark Morris called Caitlin's recent Comtesse Adele "the standout performance of the evening" in Le Comte Ory at Edmonton Opera. As Susanna in their 2020 production of Marriage of Figaro, Caitlin was hailed as "an exceptional soprano with excellent comedy".

In 2022, Caitlin portrayed the Housewife in the multi-Dora Award nominated world premiere of Gould's Wall (Current/Balkan) with Tapestry Opera and was a sparkling Despina in Edmonton Opera's Cosi fan Tutte. As Josephine in HMS Pinafore with Vancouver Opera, Janet Smith observed: "Capturing the full range of emotions of her character, Caitlin Wood has a vibrant soprano voice that easily scales the heights of Josephine's arias."

Recent concert performances for Caitlin include Vancouver Bach Choir/ Vancouver Opera Festival's premiere



of Brian Current's The River of Light, Carmina Burana with Ottawa Choral Society, and Mozart's Requiem with Windsor Symphony Orchestra. In 2023, Caitlin debuts with Regina Symphony Orchestra's baroque series in Bach's Cantata No. 202, Weichet nur, betrübte Schatten, and joins Windsor Symphony for Messiah highlights.

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

Handel's Messiah

GEORGE FRIDERIC HANDEL

George Frideric Handel's sacred oratorio, Messiah, is without question one of the most popular works in the choral/ orchestral repertoire today. The text for Messiah was selected and compiled from the Authorized (King James) Version of the Bible by Charles Jennens, an aristocrat and musician/poet of modest talent and exceptional ego. With the finished libretto in his possession, Handel began setting it to music on August 22, 1741, and completed it 24 days later. He was certainly working at white-hot speed, but this didn't necessarily indicate he was in the throes of devotional fervor. as legend has often stated. Handel composed many of his works in haste, and immediately after completing Messiah he wrote his next oratorio. Samson, in a similarly brief timespan.

Over-enthusiastic "Handelists" in the 19th century perpetuated all sorts of legends regarding the composition of Messiah. An often repeated story relates how Handel's servant found him sobbing with emotion while writing the famous "Hallelujah Chorus," and the composer claiming, "I did think I did see all Heaven before me and the great God Himself." Supposedly Handel often left his meals untouched during this compositional period, in an apparent display of devotional fasting and monastic self denial. Present-day historians more familiar with Handel's life and religious views tend to downplay these stories. It's been suggested that if Handel did indeed have visions of Heaven while he composed Messiah,

then it was only in the same manner in which he visualized the Roman pantheon of gods while he composed his opera Semele. Handel's religious faith was sincere, but tended to be practical rather than mystical.

The tradition of performing Messiah at Christmas began later in the 18th century. Following the pattern of Italian baroque opera, Messiah is divided into three parts. The first is concerned with prophecies of the Messiah's coming, drawing heavily from messianic texts in the Book of Isaiah, and concludes with an account of the Christmas story that mixes both Old and New Testament sources. The second part deals with Christ's mission and sacrifice, culminating in the grand "Hallelujah Chorus." The final, shortest section is an extended hymn of thanksgiving, an expression of faith beginning with Job's statement "I know that my Redeemer liveth" and closing with the majestic chorus "Worthy is the Lamb" and a fugal "Amen." In its focus on Christ's sacrifice.

After an early performance of Messiah in London, Lord Kinnoul congratulated Handel on the "noble entertainment." Handel is said to have replied, "My Lord, I should be sorry if I only entertained them; I wished to make them better." Certainly, Messiah carries an ennobling message to people of all faiths and credos, proclaiming "peace on earth, and goodwill towards men"— a message that continues to be timely and universal.

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
